

The two themes in “The Capital” and “the material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations”

Marx developed two themes in “The Capital”, especially in Book One “The Process of Production of Capital”. Just before Part III “The Production of Absolute Surplus-value” he said that “we shall see here, not only how capital produces, but how capital is produced.” (“Capital” vol.1 p.172) In this case, the first theme “how capital produces” means “how capital produces surplus-value” and this theme is characterized the surplus-value theory or the exploitation theory. The second theme “how capital is produced” means “how the capitalist relations themselves are produced” and this theme is characterized the reproduction of capitalist relations theory.

In the manuscript 1863-65 years of “The Capital”, he said that “the material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations” were made clear in the second theme or the reproduction of capitalist relations theory. Through change and development of the capitalist relations, there birth and growth “the material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations”.

In short, he made clear the theoretical ground of the class strives and the social revolutions by the first theme, “how capital produce”. Moreover he pursued for the inevitability of the social revolutions with analyzing “the material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations”.

But Marx did not explain where “the material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations” should birth and growth and he did not point out in what part of his books he described these “material conditions”.

He said that the unique character of the capitalist production-process existed in “the socialization of labor”, and that “the material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations” were borne and grown in this capitalist production-process. But he did not indicate any farther what factors were these “material conditions”.

In this papers we investigate what economic phenomena are “the material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations” and in what part in “The Capital” Book One these “material conditions” are explained. Further more, through these investigations we are able to get the view point of criticizing the social revolutions without “the material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations” or low level of them,

After writing “The Capital”, in 1870's Marx said that the country being most mature in these “material conditions” were England, however there has not broken out the

social revolution. “The material conditions of the dissolve of the capitalist relations” are remain unrealized. I think we inherit now these “material conditions”.
